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




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OPENING NIGHT

Mixing bold animation and compelling archival footage, it captures the escalating tensions and full-scale pandemonium that overtook the 1968 Chicago Democratic Convention.

Chicago International Film Festival 2007 - 'Silver Hugo' for Best Documentary; Sundance Film Festival 2007 - Opening Night selection An all-star cast, including performances by Nick Nolte, Mark Ruffalo, Liev Schreiber, Geoffrey Wright and Hank Azaria, *Chicago* 10 brings to life the counter-culture, wise-guy icons of the Chicago 7, the leaders of the radicalised hippies (aka 'Yippies') who clashed with Chicago police over the Vietnam War. The resulting court case was pure theatre on a national scale, as the defendants undermined the proceedings, and the Judge undermined the defendant's basic rights and dignity; as Norman Mailer and Allen Ginsberg spoke their piece, and as the proceedings slipped into farce.

Pieced together from actual courtroom transcripts, and with a dynamic style of motion capture animation that recounts both Richard Linklater's *Waking Life* and *A Scanner Darkly, Chicago 10* is a powerful reminder of the need for protest to be heard by those in power, and the power of film to creatively deploy politics.

Corinne Grant is a comedian, writer and performer best known for her work on *The Glasshouse* and *Rove Live.* She was a member of Actors For Refugees and has lent her skills as an actor, comedian and MC to various human rights organisations and groups over a number of years. She has been a proud member of the Media, Entertainment and Arts Alliance since 1996.

Anthony Kelly Activist/Nonviolence Trainer

Anthony Kelly has been an activist and nonviolence trainer for almost 20 years within Australian social justice and peace movements. He organised human rights observer teams for the large protests against the World Economic Forum in 2000 and the G20 Leaders Meeting in 2007. Anthony works for Peace Brigades International (PBI), which provides nonviolent protective accompaniment to threatened activists around the world and is currently a trainer with the PBI's Indonesia Project.

Waleed Aly Writer/Lecturer

Waleed Aly is a lecturer in politics at Monash University, working primarily within the Global Terrorism Research Centre. Previously, he was a board member of the Islamic Council of Victoria. He is frequently sought for comment by media outlets across Australia and has contributed regularly to The Australian, The Australian Financial Review and The Age. His first book, People Like Us, was published in 2007.

He has previously worked on environment and development projects in Australia, India and on his home island of Guernsey. In 2007 he completed a four-year research project on the traditional relationship between the land and people of Tibet. Simon now campaigns full-time for the human rights and democratic freedoms of the Tibetan people.

Anna Saulwick GetUp! Action for Australia

Anna Saulwick is the Justice, Rights and Democracy Campaigner at GetUp. She is a trained lawyer with a background in human rights, social justice and public law. Anna's work with GetUp has ranged across issues as diverse as human rights in Tibet, paid parental leave and reform of the immigration detention centre.

Senator Sarah Hanson-Young Australian Greens

Sarah Hanson-Young successfully ran for the Senate in the 2007 federal election, taking her seat as South Australia's first ever Greens Senator on July 1, 2008. Sarah is the youngest person ever elected to the Senate, and the youngest woman elected in the Federal Parliament's history. Prior to entering Parliament, Senator Hanson-Young worked in the fields of human rights and community activism, including a four-year stint as SA/NT Campaign Manager for Amnesty International

Set in the current climate of economic insecurity and workplace upheaval, this acclaimed Australian drama charts the story of six hardened factory workers who struggle to stay sane as they attend work each day waiting for their redundancy payouts. Determined to avoid paying out large redundancies to its long-term employees, the company sends in undercover employees to catch the workers out drinking, gambling or leaving the premises in order to rob them of their entitlements.

When the politely spoken and mysterious outsider, David (David Field), joins the workplace, panic runs through the ranks. Anxious that they will be exposed by the headoffice 'spy', top dog Jack (Colin Friels) and his followers descend into a compelling world of antagonism and brutality. When they discover that David is hiding a much darker secret the seeds are planted for an explosive finale that seals the fate of the *The Nothing Men*.

Revealing the corrosive impact of fear and anxiety, *The Nothing Men* is a film that tests the limits of tolerance, respect and human dignity.

Set in a remote village in Nepal, Durga fights to save her 12 year old daughter Laxmi from the family profession of prostitution. Trapped by poverty, class and tradition, Durga's mother sees very little choice other than to put her granddaughter's virginity up for sale to the highest bidder. As the monsoon clouds gather, Durga devises a plan to set Laxmi free.

There are 40 million domestic 'servants' in India paid practically nothing to slave for those, who comparatively, have everything.

Nishtha —a wealthy, educated Indian filmmaker —begins making a film with her maid, Lakshmi, who lives a precarious life balancing everything from forbidden love to an alcoholic father and debilitating illness. During a year and a half of dramatic changes, the two women's lives are drawn together in ways they could never have imagined.

But how will they negotiate the ingrained social hierarchies and cultural attitudes that govern their lives? And how can Nishtha answer Lakshmi's question "what sin did I commit to be born a woman?"

"The film brilliantly explores the symbiotic roles of mistress and maid, filmmaker and subject, speaker and listener, to raise key global issues as diverse as the politics of domesticity, gender and class relations, ethics, and documentary. INTERVENTION

Following the 2007 release of the Little Children Are Sacred report — which exposed a worrying prevalence of child abuse in indigenous communities - the Howard government responded by passing emergency legislation known as 'The Intervention'. This new policy generated public outcry and upturned the lives of the Northern Territory's indigenous population.

Based on 40 interviews from a cross section of the aboriginal community living in and around Alice Springs, *Intervention* discusses town camps, quarantine laws, ration cards, alcoholism and the shame and disempowerment that has ensued from the government intrusion.

Lamberti, who has lived in Alice Springs since 2005, creates an intimate forum, straight from the community's mouth. The end result is a rich dialogue of stories and viewpoints rarely found in mainstream media. The people whose lives were affected by the implementation of the policy, were never given the chance to have their say. This is their voice.

Vincent Lamberti Director (Intervention)

Vincent Lamberti is a filmmaker and composer. Originally from Melbourne, he grew up bi-culturally, his home life characterised by his Southern Italian roots while learning to be an 'Australian' at school. Since 2005, Vincent has been living in Alice Springs, and though his vocation takes him around Australia, he focuses primarily on his work with Aboriginal Town Camp communities in the Central Desert.

Chloe Hooper Writer

Chloe Hooper's first novel, A Child's Book of True Crime, became a New York Times 'Notable Book'. Her writings on the Palm Island death in custody won a Walkley Award and was shortlisted for the Amnesty International Media Awards. She has recently published, The Tall Man: Death and Life on Palm Island, about this case.

DAYS LIKE THESE





In February 2003, pro-Palestinian civil rights activist and university professor, Dr. Sami Al-Arian, was charged with providing material support to a terrorist organization. Prior to his arrest, Al-Arian was a highly regarded American citizen who attended White House briefings, advised several members of Congress, and met Presidents Clinton and Bush. However, in the two-and-a-half year lead-up to his trial, Al-Arian was held in solitary confinement, denied basic civil privileges and was deprived of full access to his lawyers.

USA vs Al-Arian is an intimate portrait that captures Al-Arian's dogged legal battle and its impact upon his family. Dragging Sami's wife, Nahla, and five children through the heartache and stigmatisation that comes with being charged with supporting terrorism, the film brings into question government tactics of silencing free speech and denying citizens their basic democratic rights. Could an American who is unashamedly pro-Palestinian ever receive a fair trial in a culture of such fear and anti-Muslim prejudice?

Julian Burnside is a commercial barrister based in Melbourne. He is President of Liberty Victoria, and has acted pro bono in many human rights cases, most famously in the Tampa litigation. He is the author of Word Watching and Watching Brief. In 2004 he was elected as a Living National Treasure.

Rob Stary is Principal of Robert Stary and Associates, one of Melbourne's leading criminal law firms. Over the years, he has represented participants in the S11 and G20 protesters, and "Jihad" Jack Thomas. 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


