
More than ever, we face a time where human rights needs to be at the forefront of our consciousness. We need to be vocal about what matters to us and encourage a society driven by values and compassion.

Assembled from footage filmed in and alongside the Egyptian Revolution and expertly edited into a stunning narrative of struggle, the film has since been updated to include Mohamed Morsi's election and his forced removal by the army in August 2013. Focusing not only on the myriad social problems plaguing Egypt, but also the country's human core, this is a "vibrant, lyrical, graphic, sobering and finally soaring testament to aesthetic and political expression" (Ann Hornaday, *The Washington Post*). *The Square* is an unforgettable experience that takes you to the heart of a movement and its people, who are committed to the ideals of freedom and human rights.

The Internet's Own Boy: The Story of Aaron Swartz

For programming prodigy and hacktivist Aaron Swartz, coding was like magic and could achieve just about anything. By his early twenties, the creator of Reddit was leading the fight to democratise digital access to information. At 26, he was arrested for illegally downloading millions of JSTOR articles as a protest against the privatisation of public access documents. Facing a possible 35-year sentence, Swartz tragically took his own life during the trial. From the director of WE ARE LEGION: The Story of the Hacktivist, this eye-opening film explores the relentlessness of the US government prosecutors and suggests his case was used as a warning for all hackers. Celebrating Swartz's vision and commitment, The Internet's Own Boy pioneers the timely discussion around the new frontier of human rights in the digital world.





OUR TREE - Forged From Fire

An exhibiting documentary

As communities in Victoria supported each other through the aftermath of the Black Saturday fires, blacksmiths the world over united to create the most ambitious public artwork and memorial in Australia – The Blacksmiths Tree.

A week after Black Saturday a group of blacksmiths agreed to create from their own fires a gum tree that would not only survive another fire, it would unite fire affected communities across Victoria. Five years on, the completed Blacksmiths Tree was installed in Strathewen, on the same day as it was conceived - Valentine's Day.

By combining locally composed music, stills, videos, time-lapse, aerial footage and interviews shot by blacksmiths, volunteers, filmmakers and the general public, *Our Tree - Forged From Fire*, tells a story of how the idea of forging a few leaves pulled together a community of artisans to create the 9.8 metre, 3 tonne stainless steel and copper Blacksmiths Tree.

Our Tree, an exhibiting documentary by Andrew Garton, illuminates stories of resilience and healing through the making of The Blacksmiths Tree, from its inception to its completion.

This time reinterpreting Benjamin Britten's opera *Noye's Fludde*, relocating the story of Noah's Ark to present-day South Africa, and re-imagining Noah as a woman who must hold her family together. Performed entirely in Xhosa with an irresistible score, *Unogumbe* opens with dark, sombre scenes but becomes a vibrant celebration of life that will have you dancing along.

Follow the extraordinary path of Serge Kakudji, who leaves the Democratic Republic of the Congo to follow his dream of becoming a professional opera singer. Snapshots of life in his native Lubumbashi and his adoptive Paris reveal that a blend of immense talent, dedication and familial support has helped Serge navigate the white, elitist world of opera. Heralded as a hero at home in the Congo, in Paris he remains marginalised. Caught between these two worlds, Serge's incredible desire and ambition to succeed in the face of adversity will leave you with an overwhelming sense of triumph.

MELBOURNE PREMIERE OF THE NEWLY RESTORED VERSION

When a French actress travels to Hiroshima to make an anti-war film, her brief affair with a troubled Japanese architect provokes intense recollections of her first love with a German WWII Soldier. 





For many Vietnamese people the experience of leaving their homeland and travelling by uncertain means to Australia was profound. Crossing borders, looking for ways to belong and establishing new identities were just some of the challenges people faced. Lives and families were altered and in turn Australian society was enriched by this new wave of settlement. This exhibition brings together five contemporary artists whose practices and perspectives are informed by their links to both Vietnam and Australia. THANH DUONG

Thanh Duong was born in Cholon, Vietnam. Her family originally came from Fujian Province in China. After arriving in Australia in 1980 and completing tertiary studies in computing, she renewed her art interest and studied Lingnan style Chinese Painting in 1989 with the well-known artist Patrick Lam. She completed the Diploma of Visual Arts in 2008 and her BA in Fine Art at Monash University Melbourne in 2012.

MINH PHAN

Artist Minh Phan was the winner of the 2013 Heartlands Refugee Art Prize, a national award open to artists from refugee backgrounds. Minh also won second prize in the Heartlands Prize in 2012. He is now completing a Masters in Fine Art at the Victorian College of the Arts.

KHUE NGUYEN

Khue Nguyen graduated from the Fine Arts College in Saigon in 1984, escaped Vietnam in 1986, and arrived in Australia in 1987. In 2008, after working for years as a graphic designer, Khue decided to pursue full time art practice, which led him to become a finalist with his self-portrait, *Unleashed*, in the prestigious Archibald Prize of 2010. Khue is the first Vietnamese name ever to reach the finals.

QUAN TRE

Quan Tre's works are characterised by the use of vibrant geometric forms, which he uses to explore duality in 2D.

PHUONG NGO

With a Bachelor of Fine Art (Honours) from RMIT University, Phuong Ngo has been a finalist in the Churchie National Emerging Art Prize at Griffith University Art Gallery, Brisbane, and the Macquarie Digital Portraiture Award at the National Portrait Gallery, Canberra. Recent exhibitions include Domino Theory, Centre for Contemporary Photography, Melbourne, 2012; The Vietnam Archive Project: Slide #1, Seventh Gallery, Melbourne, 2012; and My Dad the People Smuggler, Counihan Gallery, Melbourne, 2013. He is currently exhibiting 'Look Past', at Melbourne Now at the National Gallery of Victoria.
